GLASGOW COLOUR STUDIES GROUP

Notes following the Second Meeting, 13th June 2007

The second meeting of the GCSG was attended by over twenty people, and took place in the seminar room at STELLA (Software for Teaching English Language and Literature and its Assessment), University of Glasgow. Thanks are due to Jean Anderson who offered the location for this meeting, to Christian Kay who acted as master of ceremonies, and to Rachel Smith and helpers for dealing with the refreshments.

Papers Presented at the Second Meeting:

- Carole Biggam spoke on 'Berlin and Kay's Evolutionary Sequence: Is It Really Understood?' The previously circulated abstract is as follows: In 1969 Brent Berlin and Paul Kay published an evolutionary sequence for the acquisition of Basic Colour Categories in languages. It was suggested that the sequence represented a language universal. Since then, many scholars have mis-interpreted and mis-used the sequence, and many have apparently overlooked crucial aspects of the later revisions.
- Norman Tennent spoke on 'Colour Matching in the Restoration of Glass and Ceramics'. The previously circulated abstract is as follows: For conservation-restoration of ceramics and glass (including stained glass), dyed and pigmented resins are used to replace missing portions of the original works of art. It is important to achieve a perfect colour match using dyes and pigments which do not fade. It is also necessary to avoid the problem of metamerism, the phenomenon by which restorations which appear invisible in the studio can be very obvious in museum display lighting conditions. This talk will illustrate how stable, non-metameric restorations can be achieved by means of conservation science research.
- David Simmons spoke on 'Colour and Emotion'. The previously circulated abstract is as follows: There is much anecdotal evidence for a link between specific colours and specific emotions, and some of these links have filtered through into language ("feeling blue", "green with envy" "seeing red" etc. etc.). I shall summarise my own and others' experimental work on how solid these links are and what might underlie them.
- **Thanks:** The speakers are thanked for colourful and interesting presentations, which prompted questions and discussion, as far as time allowed.
- **Text of talks:** A member unable to attend the meeting has asked whether she could receive the texts of the talks. As a matter of principle for all GCSG talks, anyone wanting to receive such texts must contact the speakers concerned, and make their request directly to them.

Date:
