Each credit course in this brochure is marked with the number of credits awarded on successful completion of the intended learning outcomes. Credit courses are designed for students who wish to study for credit, but are also open to students who prefer not to complete assessment, but wish to study for interest only. 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Archaeology, Classical Studies & Egyptology

Ancient Egypt and the Ancient Near East —

Ancient Egyptian archaeology - people and places 1A

Day: Wednesday 30/09/15 – 02/12/15 **Time:** 19.00 – 21.00

The course focuses on the material culture of both lived and funerary spaces in ancient Egypt. Students will be introduced to the main issues governing the theory and practice of Egyptian archaeology to provide background for more specific case studies of sites from the Old Kingdom to the end of the New Kingdom.

Ancient Egyptian texts 1A

Day: Thursday 01/10/15 – 03/12/15 **Time:** 19.00 – 21.00

Aimed at complete beginners, this course teaches you how to read ancient Egyptian hieroglyphs. As well as learning to recognise the most common signs, you will also be grounded in Middle Egyptian grammar with a view to reading funerary inscriptions. The religious and social lives of the ancient Egyptians are also studied to put the texts we read into their cultural context.

The course will focus on case study texts which will be read together in class. Some grammar will be covered for revision purposes, but the course is not suitable for complete beginners.

Coptic: the language and lives of early Christians in Egypt

This course provides a unique opportunity to learn basic skills for reading Coptic—the language of the indigenous Christians of first millennium Egypt—using texts that document the lives of the villagers and monks, as well as passages from the New Testament and apocryphal gospel.

Waterloo uncovered: the archaeology an iconic battle

Day: Saturday 17 October 2015 Time: 10.00-17.00

2015 marks the bicentenary of the Battle of Waterloo which saw the defeat of Napoleon's forces. With the aim of transforming our understanding of the Waterloo battle site, a new archaeological project has begun, directed in the field by Tony Pollard of the University of Glasgow in partnership with the Goldstream Guards. The special day event will feature experts on the politics, the weaponry and military forces, and the artistic and monumental legacy of the battle, as well as Dr. Pollard himself talking about the results of the project, and will include a chance to see and handle some of the exciting finds that have just come to light. Ancient Egyptian archaeology - people and places 1B

Day: Wednesday 13/01/16 – 16/03/16 **Time:** 19.00 – 21.00

This course builds on topics covered in Ancient Egyptian archaeology - people and places 1A but can be taken independently. It focuses on the material culture associated with specific people or groups of people in the past, examining the archaeological traces left behind by diverse communities incorporating various social levels, including workers' villages, garrisons and the remains of New Kingdom palace sites.

Ancient Egyptian texts 1B

Day: Thursday 14/01/16 – 17/03/16 **Time:** 19.00 – 21.00

Following on from Ancient Egyptian texts 1A, this course continues to teach you how to read ancient Egyptian hieroglyphs. It can be taken by those wishing to brush up rusty hieroglyphic reading skills, but is not suitable for complete beginners. We continue to learn about Middle Egyptian grammar, reading further funerary texts but turning our attention also to royal inscriptions. Again, we contextualise the texts we are reading against the backdrop of ancient Egyptian culture.

Queen Hatshepsut: the life and times of a female pharaoh

Queen Hatshepsut was one of ancient Egypt's greatest pharaohs, but only one of a handful of female rulers. This day school reviews the evidence of her rise to power, her courtiers, her architectural and religious programme, and her preparations for the afterlife. Touching upon 18th Dynasty objects from museum collections in Glasgow, we will explore aspects of life in Egypt's Golden Age.

Tying in with a major exhibition visiting Glasgow in 2016, this day school goes in search of the truths behind the myths.

Introduction to the Ancient Near East

The Ancient Near East, stretching from ancient Anatolia in the north and Mesopotamia in the south, was a dynamic patchwork of neighbouring cities and empires, often at odds, but also trading goods and ideas with one another. Drawing on archaeology, religion and art, this course introduces students to the cultural, social and historical landscapes of the Ancient Near East (from c. 7,000 – c. 600 BC), charting the rise and fall of its rich and turbulent powers.

The Vikings in Europe and beyond

Day: Monday 28/09/15 – 30/11/15

Time: 19.00 – 21.00

Using historical and archaeological evidence, this course follows the Vikings' movements throughout Europe, the Baltic and Middle East and across the North Atlantic. Students will examine written sources, artefacts and archaeological sites to better understand how people lived and died during the Viking Age, as well as the legacy of the Vikings.

The archaeology of hunter gatherers: the Palaeolithic and Mesolithic of Northern Britain

Day: Wednesday 30/09/15 – 02/12/15 **Time:** 19.00 – 21.00

This course uses archaeological, environmental and ethnographic evidence and object-handling sessions to explore hunter gatherers' patterns of life, the customs marking their deaths, and their changing landscape of melting ice-sheets, tsunamis and other ecological events. The focus is Northern Britain, but we will draw upon similar evidence from north-west Europe, covering the period from the Palaeolithic (13,600-9,600 BCE) to the Mesolithic (9,600-3,600 BCE).

Complementary to but separate from 'The archaeology of World War One', this course uses recent archaeological research to examine the origins, prosecution, and consequences of the Second World War. Topics to be examined include the archaeology of: the war in Europe and the Mediterranean, the war in the Pacific, the war at sea and in the air, the home front, the Holocaust/war erimes, and post-war geopolitics.

Scottish brochs and the Roman Empire

Day: Tuesday 16/02/16 - 15/03/16 Time: 14.00 - 16.00

Scottish brochs are small but massive drystone towers often containing undisturbed evidence of both local events, and those happening further away. A few brochs, particularly in the south, witnessed the three Roman invasions of Scotland. Their archaeology prevides a unique insight into the nature of the impact of the Roman Imperial Army on local Iron Age tribesmen. Focusing particularly on Dun Ardtreck on Skye and Leckie in Stirlingshire we will explore the impact Roman influence had on native culture.

Landscape and religion in the Mediterranean

Day: Saturday 23/04/16 **Time:** 10.00 – 16.00

Religious experience has always been deeply embedded in particular places and landscapes. People see natural features such as groves, springs, hills and islands as sacred, thus they become the focus of rituals, dedications and sacrifices, often with sensory experiences specific to the place. We explore this impact of landscape on ritual, from prehistoric cave sanctuaries to the Islamic Hajj route.

Empires of faith: The forging of Europe C.800-1100

Day: Tuesday 29/09/15 - 15/03/16 Time: 19.00 - 21.00

Beginning with Charlemagne and his world, with its immense power and deep faith, acts of loyalty and treachery, spectacular culture and terrifying violence, we will investigate the events and processes which led to the rise of empires that forged Western Europe: Carolingian, Ottonian, and West Saxon. Drawing on a rich and varied collection of written sources, we will seek to challenge some of the misconceptions of this pivotal period in the making of European identity.

What social, cultural and religious influences led men and women to take the cross? The history of the Crusades is often obscured by modern prejudices and misconceptions; drawing on a variety of written evidence and the latest research, you will reappraise and challenge such misconceptions to gain a deeper understanding of this fascinating period. We will investigate crusading from the 'inside', the origins and evolution of the crusading movement, who the crusaders were. the responses to crusading, and the extension of crusading beyond the Holy Land.

The Greek and Roman World —

Classical Greek Civilisation 1B

Day: Monday 28/09/15 – 14/03/16 **Time:** 19.00 – 21.00

Independent of but a partner to Classical Greek Civilisation 1A, this course comprehensively introduces the cultural world of ancient Greece, exploring history, literature, philosophy as well as art and archaeology. It has two principal themes: 'War and Peace' and 'Gods and Men' in classical Athens. It spans topics from the Trojan War myths, Greek tragic theatre, ancient religion, and some of the earliest surviving philosophical texts. All texts are read in translation.

Highlands to Islands, Forth to Clyde: Exploring Scotland's Archaeological and Historical Past - in association with The Hunterian Museum's Cradle of Scotland Exhibition

Day Saturday, 5 December 2015 **Time 10.00 - 17.00**

Partnering with the Hunterian Museum's "Cradle of Scotland" exhibition, this day event takes a longitudinal approach to Scotland's archaeological past. Six experts in their respective fields will divide Scotland's 13,000+ year history into distinct periods. These will include: pre-history, the Roman and Post-Roman world, the Picts and Early Medieval Scotland, the Norse, the medieval world, and Scotland's industrial rise. Participants will also have the opportunity to visit the "Cradle of Scotland" exhibition with the lecturers, exploring the sites and artefacts up close with the experts at their disposal. Using vibrant images, we study the importance of the Greek Olympian gods within the tradition of the Pan-Hellenic games of the ancient Olympiad, focusing on the festivals themselves and the archaeology of the sites. We'll explore the athletes as elite individuals and their emergence as a professional group. We'll also study the beginnings of Roman funeral games and the progression towards the gladiatorial contests that became famous in amphitheatres such as the Colosseum.

Cradle of Scotland 3 September 2015 – 3 January 2016 Hunterian Art Gallery Admission free

Cradle of Scotland is a major new collaborative exhibition which reveals the dramatic discoveries made by the University of Glasgow's Strathearn Environs and Royal Forteviot (SERF) project.

The project, which focuses on the historic Forteviot landscape in Perthshire, has resulted in a number of remarkable archaeological finds. Cradle of Scotland combines these original artefacts with replicas and visualisations, creating a stunning exhibition that explores the archaeological history of Scotland.

Cradle of Scotland also showcases the latest advances, technologies and discoveries in Scottish archaeology. Visitors will learn about the modern archaeological process in Scotland, and about the application of latest investigative and reconstructive methods.

The exhibition is jointly curated by The Hunterian and Perth Museum and Art Gallery, where it will go in Spring 2016. In Glasgow, it will be supported by a range of exciting events hosted by The Hunterian and the Centre for Open Studies. Details will be posted on our websites.



The Certificate in Field Archaeology

This is a two-year programme for which students receive 120 credits at Level 1

The programme consists of three 20-credit courses each year. Students will be required to enrol and pay for all three courses at the start of the academic year. In 2015-16 we are running the second year of the programme. In order to take the Year 2 courses, students should have completed the three courses of Year 1 of the programme.

The overall aim of the programme is to introduce students to the fundamentals of archaeological field survey and British, especially Scottish, archaeology.

The courses combine lectures with essay and project writing, visits to museums and archaeological sites, hands-on laboratory classes, computer-based exercises and practical field experience, by means of which students will be introduced to subjects ranging from aerial photography to archaeo-zoology, with a particular focus on field survey techniques.

Tutors for the programme are drawn predominantly from amongst practising archaeologists, with further contributions from members of staff of the University of Glasgow and other qualified professionals. Specific techniques and period studies throughout the programme are taught by recognised specialists in the relevant fields.

Post-Roman and medieval archaeology of Scotland

Day: Tuesday 06/10/15-08/12/15 Day: Tuesday 12/01/16 - 15/03/16

Time: 19.00 – 21.00

The course introduces students to the historical archaeology of Scotland, from the end of the Roman occupation to the present day. It includes both a chronological framework and insights into the benefits and complexities an archaeological perspective provides to periods with wildly differing levels and qualities of surviving testimonies and records.

Theory and practice of field archaeology 2

Day: luesday 12/01/16 - 15/03/16

Time: 19.00 – 21.00

The course introduces students to more advanced methodological approaches, techniques and theoretical concepts, reflecting recent trends in the subject. These include landscape archaeology, phenomenology and psychogeography, the archaeology of buildings, battlefield archaeology, 'public' archaeology, ethics in archaeology and the growing importance of Geographical Information Systems in archaeological research and management.

Introduction to art psychotherapy

Day: Monday 28/09/15 – 14/03/16 **Time:** 13.00 – 15.30

Art therapy (now known as art psychotherapy) is a psychological therapy that uses art materials for self-expression and reflection in the presence of a trained art psychotherapist. It is a psychological treatment that helps someone to express and explore thoughts and feelings that they might otherwise struggle to put into words. It is another way of understanding and processing emotional problems. Our course will aim to offer you direct experience of using creativity and artmaking for greater awareness of the role and function of an art psychotherapist; to provide a firm foundation for the possible progression onto a postgraduate MSc in art psychotherapy. It does not offer professional qualifications to practise art psychotherapy nor does it provide personal therapy. A key part of our course is to give you a 'hands on' experience by making art work in a group setting, engaging in a range of creative workshops and learning through case presentations and group discussions.

The course will be a systematic study through geological time, including descriptions of the National Parks such as Yosemite, Grand Canyon, and Yellowstone.
