




What are the Interdisciplinary Research Themes (IRTs)?

- Bring together researchers within and beyond COSS around themes that address the world's most pressing problems:
 - Sustainability
 - Challenges in Changing Cities
 - Justice, Insecurity and Fair Decision Making
 - Addressing Inequalities
 - Digital Society and Economy
- Current structure:
 - Academic leadership team 3-6 people from at least 3 different Schools
 - Post-doctoral Research Fellow 2 years FT
 - Professional services support from Madeleine and Morgan
 - No consumables budget
- Position the research interests of COSS internally and externally



Three pillars of activity

- Research income
 - Bidding
 - Team building
- Skills and culture
 - Events
 - Skills development
 - Ideation events
- Impact and engagement
 - Network events
 - Dissemination
 - Work with external partners



IRT refresh

- Purpose
 - Bottom up the ideas have to come from you
 - Has to be 'big picture'
 - Be ambitious!
- More than the sum of the parts
 - Not about you or your individual research agenda
 - What can we do together that we can't do individually?

Criteria

- Interdisciplinarity
 - Leadership team spans 3 or more COSS Schools
 - Potential for ID research in COSS
 - Awareness of funding landscape and existing clusters
- Leadership development and inclusion
 - Approach to shared leadership
 - Plan to ensure themes act inclusively
 - Understanding of 'research ambition and how this theme supports that
- Feasibility and outcomes
 - Desired outcomes under the three pillars
 - Feasibility in terms of timeframe, risks, budget/resource



Application form

- Title:
 - Try to capture the 'big idea'
- Leadership team
 - 300 hours to be spread across (the COSS parts of) the team
- Theme description and overview of desired outcomes
 - What do you hope to achieve?
 - 250 words






Application form – interdisciplinarity

- What is the theme's potential for ID research involving COSS?
 - 250 words
- What is your understanding of the funding landscape in this area?
 - 250 words
 - Are there schemes that would suit this theme?
 - Opportunities with partner insitustions?

Application form – leadership, development and inclusion

- Approach to shared leadership
 - 250 words
 - Plans to work with CRSO, Schools, other university investments (ARC, Glasgow Changing Futures)
 - Any experience of this kind of leadership? Track record?
 - Development opportunities?
- Ensuring the IRT is inclusive to a wider group than the leadership team
 - 250 words



Feasibility and outcomes

- Initial plans for research income
 - 400 words
- Initial plans for skills and culture
 - 400 words
- Initial plans for impact and engagement
 - 400 words
- We recognise that your early plans for later years may change



Provide an overview of year 1 activities (what do you want to do?) and intended outcomes (what do you want to achieve through these activities?).

We know logic models are hotly contested. This is a simplified model to provide an overview of intended outcomes, planned activities to achieve these, and expected resource needed. Start with your intended outcomes and then work backwards – which activities will help achieve these outcomes? (Max 2 pages).

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INPUTS Rough idea of resource needed for each activity. Will you need to draw on wider expertise e.g. KE, researcher development?	ACTIVITIES AND OUTPUTS What will you do/ create to achieve your planned outcomes? Some activities might support more than one outcome – you could use numbering and/or repetition to make this clear.	OUTCOMES You must identify at least one outcome for each pillar (research income, skills and culture, impact and engagement). Some outcomes might fall under more than one pillar – see example.
EXAMPLE: University venue (free) + catering for 25; College research office/ researcher development team input on workshop design.	EXAMPLE: In person workshop with College research office focussed on mid-career researchers and the skills/ challenges of interdisciplinary funding bids.	EXAMPLE: Increase mid-career researchers' confidence in applying for interdisc funding (RESEARCH INCOME, SKILLS AND CULTURE).
