

Duo B!z'art

A PROFESSIONAL piano duet is a rare phenomenon to encounter in Orkney and we have to thank Orkney Arts Society for featuring Geoffrey Baptiste and Andre Roe (otherwise known as Duo B!z'art) in a programme of music for this combination by French and Russian composers.

On Saturday, October 26, Stromness Town Hall was the well-attended venue for this energetic pair, who gave the recently refurbished Fazioli grand piano a thorough workout during the course of the programme.

They started with Bizet's Jeux d'Enfants suite, a group of 12 pieces each describing a particular game. This was not an easy choice as each piece needs its own character to be established in the space of about two-three minutes and every game" is different from its neighbour. The rippling Swing, the stop/start of the Top, the gently rocking Doll were clearly established instantly and we passed on through the pictures of, for instance, Trumpet and Drum, Blind Man's Buff and Little Husband, Little Wife (a lively pair In this rendering) to the triumphant finale of the Ball-a spirited gallop taken with effortless panache at breathtaking speed by this talented pair.

Having warmed us all up nicely, they then took us into a world of serious piano duet writing with Rachmaninov's Six Pieces op 11 dating from 1894. Rachmaninov's solo piano writing often sounds as if the pianist had more than two hands, so with four at his disposal he made the most of the

resources! One of the challenges of successful duet playing is to avoid getting in one another's way, and it was a pleasure to see how effortlessly this pair worked together, keeping the music flowing, passing it to and fro as necessary. This set of pieces is largely unfamiliar ground, and it was a pleasant surprise to encounter Russian themes familiar from other sources. The *Theme Russe* of piece number 3 and *Slava* of number 6 were more familiar (to me at least) from their use by Mussorgsky in Boris Godunov and it was fascinating to hear how Rachmaninov worked them for this combination. A real treasure.

After a well-earned interval, the players wapped ends and continued with Debussy's Six Enjaraphes Antiques in its original format as a duet instead of the more frequently solo version which pops up from time to time. Composed thirty years after the Rachmaninov, it also consists of six movements which evoke mysterious pictures with titles such as For a Nameless Tomb or For the Egyptian Woman, leaving us to make of them

what we will.

This was followed by Faure's *Dolly Suite*, again six movements taking us back to childhood. Here we were on more familiar ground, especially those of us old enough to remember Listen with Mother with its signature tune *Berceuse*, the first of the six. Once again the duo dealt with it briskly, no sentimentality here, and continued through the varying moods of each piece. The suite was dedicated to Regina-Helene Bardac, the Dolly of the title, and one can only be grateful that she inspired

a suite which has been such a gift for duettists ever since.

Just when we might have imagined that life was complete, Duo B!z'art introduced us to the world of Nikolai Kapustin, a Ukrainian-born composer who worked in Soviet Russia and, astonishingly, wrote in a style reminiscent of Gershwin of all people! His Sinfonietta op 49, composed for orchestra in 1986 and later reworked for piano duet, is high-powered stuff and it was given the works by this remarkable pair. The Overture got us going, the Slow Waltz and Intermezzo gave breathing space and then the Rondo whirled us

to an exhilarating climax to finish us off! This is remarkable music and for those of us to whom the name Kapustin is so far unknown there is a variety of his music available on YouTube. Enjoy!

As an encore, we were given a piece by another jazz-oriented composer, Constant Lambert, with a nocturne described as 'black music for the white keys', a delightfully frothy sweetmeat to send us home with happy memories of a very successful evening's music-making. Our thanks should go to Duo B!z'art for opening our ears to this unusual repertoire and to Orkney Arts Society for yet another successful promotion.
