

A chair of Scottish History and Literature in the University of Glasgow was established in 1913, funded largely from public subscription by the people of Glasgow and the West of Scotland. This recognised Scottish History and Literature as academic disciplines in their own right. To celebrate the centenary, and acknowledge the crucial contribution of Glaswegians a hundred years ago in funding the chair, a series of lectures on aspects of Scottish History and Literature, with special reference to Glasgow, will be given in the Mitchell Library by academics from the university.
