POST-SHAH DENIZ DECISION: WHAT'S THE WAY FORWARD FOR CENTRAL AND SOUTH-EAST EUROPE?

### 6 November, 2013, Brussels

### **Overview:**

Following the decision in June 2013 in favour of the Trans Adriatic Pipeline (TAP) over the Nabucco West project, thinking on energy security issues is taking a new course in Central and South-East Europe. Countries of the region and the European Commission need to come out with a solution to the question of natural gas supply security for Central and South-East Europe. The Shah Deniz decision has provoked serious debates both in the region and in Brussels. The Hungarian Presidency of the Visegrad Group aims at generating in depth discussion about these issues.

With the decision to favour the Trans Adriatic Pipeline project, Central and South-East Europe is lacking a credible alternative for supply diversification. Investments in missing infrastructure developments, like interconnectors, storage capacities, upgrading the internal systems, the development and connection of energy hubs can prove to be essential to enhance the energy security and the region's integration in the EU's energy market. In the field of policy making, the drafting of a regional approach could serve as a guideline for future negotiations. The European Commission has been looking for a win-win solution, which still needs to be met. During the Brussels seminar, academia, government and business officials will analyse the situation and try to form an opinion on how to address these challenges in the current environment.

The objective of the seminar is to align thinking on infrastructure development projects of Central and South-East European countries after the Shah Deniz decision and to encourage more cooperation in the region in terms of energy supply security and market integration. Rethinking the options of Central and South-Eastern Europe and formulating a common regional approach would be the desired outcome of the event.
