# Why 'commuting'?

- Lower retention rates than first year students in Halls
- Includes 'non-traditional' or 'Widening Participation' students

### Examples of WP criteria:

- Schools with low progression to HE
- SIMD disadvantaged postcodes
- Time spent in care
- Adult learners: Access/HN entrants
- In receipt of EMA
- Refugee/ asylum seeker status
- First in family



# **Our WP Programmes / entry routes**

Schools (Engage with schools by HE progression rate)

- Top-Up Programme (25% or fewer leavers progress to HE)
- Summer School (27% or fewer leavers progress to HE)
- Reach: access to Medicine, Vet Medicine, Law, Dentistry and from 2015 to Engineering, Education, Acc / Fin (35% or fewer leavers progress to HE)
- Access to a Career in Teaching (all GCC schools)

### Adult learners

- Centre for Open Studies Access courses
- Scottish Wider Access Programme



- 'Drop-in café' during Freshers' Week 2012
  WP students invited by email
- Qualitative research 2012/13
  - Covering transition to first year compared to expectations; preparation provided by pre-entry course (if appropriate); experience of Freshers' Week and induction activities
- 51 students were interviewed in 5 focus groups
- 84 students responded to an online survey



# Research findings


Barriers to Freshers' Week/ induction participation:

- Events finish too late for travelling home;
- Perceived as not aimed at them but for (young) students staying in Halls;
- Information overload.

### **Enablers:**

- More likely to attend events with an academic focus as these perceived to be the most relevant;
- More likely to come up to the University with friends.

### What Works? Student Retention & Success Phase I summary report

Particularly effective interventions... [for retention and success]... start preentry, and have an overt academic purpose. Such interventions often develop peer networks and friendships, create links with academic members of staff, provide key information, shape realistic expectations, improve academic skills, develop students' confidence, demonstrate future relevance, and nurture belonging.


#### **STAR Induction Guidelines**

- 1. Activities should familiarise students with the local area, campus & support services
- 2. Activities should highlight students' academic obligations and obligations of staff
- 3. Activities should support development of independent study habits for HE
- 4. Events should provide the foundations for social interactions between students and the development of communities of practice
- 5. Activities should promote good communication between staff and students
- 6. Induction is required to manage transitions between elements of courses.

# New 'local' students were invited (via email)

### **LSO 2013**

- 1550 invited: 39% MD40, 15% mature, 33% WP schools
- 318 attended: 45% MD40, 17% mature, 42% WP schools


### **LSO 2014**

- 1623 invited: 38% MD40, 23% mature, 30% WP schools
- 495 attended: 36% MD40, 19% mature, 38% WP schools

### Frequently asked at LSO 2014






# **Local Student Orientation event 2014 evaluation**

140 responses to feedback survey (28%)

- 95% agreed the event was enjoyable or very enjoyable
- Best thing about the day was meeting people
- But it could be improved by more time to meet people on your course

# **Local Student Orientation event 2014 evaluation**

- Participants gained confidence & reassurances, lots of information and made friends
- 32% say event participation affected experience of Freshers' Week
- 50% say participation affected experience of starting classes in Week 1
- Around 90% still see people they first met on the day –
  some made their closest student friends at the event



# Impact on student retention

### LSO 2013

- 92.5% of attendees continuing their studies at Glasgow at 1 Dec 2014
- 87.0% of those invited but who did not attend are continuing


### LSO 2014

- 3% of attendees have withdrawn from their studies by end of Semester 2 in 2014/15
- 7% of those invited but did not attend have withdrawn from their studies by end of Semester 2 in 2014/15



# Impact on retention risk groups – LSO 2013


#### Percentage of 2013 local entrants continuing their studies after Year 1

# **Conclusions**

- Students need to have the opportunity to meet each other, primarily, and feel they belong to the broader community by meeting staff and senior students
- Having an academic purpose is particularly of interest to the diverse and growing group of 'non-traditional' students who aren't quite so invested in 'student life'
- Good induction / orientation to the social and academic side of university life can positively impact on transition to university for the groups most 'at risk' in terms of engagement, retention and success
