# How to select courses at the University of Glasgow 

Planning for the next academic session for 2024/25 is ongoing. Course list information for each subject will be added here in due course.

Please refer to this guide to see if a course or course level is available to visiting students. If referring to our online course catalogue for course matching please note not all courses run every year and some run alternate years or semesters.

How many credits do I have to take?

- 60 Glasgow credits for 1 semester or
- 120 Glasgow credits for a full year - this should be split equally across both semesters

All students are required to take a full course load. Work that you are doing for your home university while studying at Glasgow does not count towards your Glasgow credit load.

## What level should I pick?

- The University of Glasgow offers a four-year undergraduate degree programme: Level 1 ( 1 xxx ) = first year, Level $2(2 x x x)=$ second year, and so on
- You can normally request courses from levels $1-4$ in the subject you have a major in; you would be restricted to levels 1 or 2 in subject areas in which you do not have prior experience
- Level 5 ( 5 xxx ) courses are postgraduate courses and are not available to visiting students

Pre-Arrival enrolment will be based on application course approval by the academic subject coordinator and subject to course capacity. You will receive feedback on your course choices before the start of your visit. For any specific course related enquiries or clarifications at this time, please contact the visiting students team.

## REMEMBER!

The University of Glasgow cannot guarantee courses in advance for visiting students.

- Not all of our courses run every year and some run in alternate semesters.
- Some courses might be oversubscribed at the point of enrolment, or there may be timetable clashes.
- It is advisable to have back up options in mind and remain flexible in your course selection process. If your preferred course isn't available, you should be prepared to explore alternative courses that align with your academic goals and requirements.
- If needed, confirm with your home university that they can approve these alternatives.
- Your course enrolment will be finalised when you arrive in Glasgow.

## College of Arts and Humanities

## Archaeology (ARCH)

- No prerequisites for Level 1 courses - please note that these courses are in high demand
- Prerequisite knowledge required for levels 2, 3 and 4


## Celtic Civilisation \& Scottish Gaelic (CELTCIV/GAELIC)

Gaelic:

- Gaelic 1 (Beginners) - no previous knowledge required
- Gaelic 1 (Intermediate) and Gaelic 2 (Intermediate) - some previous experience required
- Gaelic 1 (Advanced) and Gaelic 2 (Advanced) - students are required to be fluent
- Level 1 and 2 Gaelic language courses are not available in semester 2 , therefore semester 1 or full year study durations are recommended


## Celtic Civilisation:

- Level 1 and 2 - open to all and require no previous background

Prerequisite knowledge required for levels 3 and 4 in both subjects.

## Classics, Greek \& Latin (CLASSIC/GREEK/LATIN)

- There are language prerequisites for all Greek and Latin options at all levels except LATIN1A and GREEK1A (Beginners) options
- If you have previous knowledge of the language, you will be given a diagnostic test to determine which level is suitable
- Level 1 Classical Civilisation modules are open to all and require no previous background
- Prerequisite knowledge required for levels 2,3 and 4


## Comparative Literature (COMPLIT)

- Full year students: levels 1 - 4 available
- Single semester students can choose from levels 1, 2 and some single semester version level 4 courses
- In addition to Comparative Literature, students under Comparative Literature agreements can request courses from Scottish Literature, History and Czech/Polish/Russian etc. offered as 'subsidiary languages' depending on linguistic aptitude and academic background.
Please note availability of courses in History may be limited.


## Czech \& Polish (CZECH/POLISH)

- Czech and Polish can be taken up to level 3 only
- Students attending under these language agreements can request courses from Comparative Literature, Scottish Literature, History etc. depending on linguistic aptitude and academic background. Please note availability of courses in History may be limited.


## English Language \& Linguistics (ENGLANG)

- No prerequisites for entry into level 1 courses
- Prerequisite knowledge required for levels 2 and 4
- Level 3 courses not available to visiting students
- These courses are only available to students coming from European partner subject specific or university wide agreements and for full year duration only. Please check with your home exchange office.


## English for Academic Purposes (EAS/EAP)

- EAP language courses have specific language level entry requirements and restrictions
- EAP 1 and EAP 2 are both high in contact hours ( 5 hours per week each) and have been designed to respond to different needs
- EAP 1- places on the course are normally offered to students whose English level is not above B2 or IELTS 6.0 or equivalent unless your scores in writing and/or speaking are significantly lower
- EAP 2- places on the course are normally offered to students whose English level is not below B2 or IELTS 6.0 (or equivalent) and above C1 or IELTS 7.5 or higher in all skills
- Please note: EAP 2 course is not available to students enrolled on any English Language/Linguistics courses at the University of Glasgow or their home institution
- For more information visit the EAP section on our EAS website


## English Literature (ENGLIT)

- No prerequisites required for level 1
- Prerequisites for level 2 and level 4
- Students cannot mix course levels
- If you are an English major, you may take up to two level 4 courses per semester. You should take your remaining 20 credits in an alternative subject. Literature classes are also available in the subject areas of Comparative Literature and Scottish Literature
- If you are not an English major, you are restricted to level 1 or level 2. You will not be given access to level 4
- As the assessments are based on close reading, a high level of English is recommended
- Students may request courses from level 1 and 2 but please note these are often oversubscribed and they do require some relevant academic background in the subject
- Level 3 and 4 courses require substantial academic background in the subject
- Level 3 and 4 practical film-making courses are not available to visiting students
- Students can only take a maximum of two level 4 courses per semester


## French (FRENCH)

- Most courses in French run over both semesters and there will be limited choice for students visiting for a single semester, especially for honours (level 4) courses
- Students seeking beginners to intermediate language courses for a single semester should refer to the French for International Mobility courses listed under Modern Foreign Languages in the Course Catalogue
- FRENCH1005 (Beginners French) is an accelerated 40-credit course. It can be taken for semester 1 only with the Convenor's agreement for 20 credits. Inexperienced language learners may cope better with the International Mobility courses
- Other level 1 and 2 French language and culture courses worth 20 credits can normally be taken for a single semester for 10 credits, subject to approval from the Course Convenor
- FRENCH4086 Senior Honours Written Language can be taken for a single semester for 10 credits. Advanced level of French and English required
- MODLANG4102 (Translation Studies/English to French Translation) can be taken by French native speakers either for both semesters ( 20 credits) or for semester 1 only ( 10 credits)


## German (GERMAN)

- Full year and semester 1 only students may take level 1 Beginners (GERMAN1003). Full year students will be given priority on this course, semester 1 only students will only be allocated after full year students are placed and gain half the credits.
- Prerequisite knowledge required for levels 2,3 and 4
- German language courses are not available to native German speakers
- Students attending under German agreements are welcome to request courses from other subjects in the School of Modern Languages and Cultures, however, there may be timetable clashes
- Semester 2 only students cannot take any language courses with a GERMAN code - you should refer to Languages for International Mobility instead
- If you need Literature courses for your home degree, you can also choose from Scottish Literature, Comparative Literature and English Literature (levels 1 or 2 only)
- No prerequisites for entry into level 1 courses
- Level 1 is available to all students, subject to course capacity
- Prerequisite knowledge required for levels 2,3 and 4
- Please note that not all courses shown in the course catalogue will run every year


## History of Art (HISTART)

- Level 1 is available to all students, subject to course capacity
- Prerequisites are required for level 2 and subject to course capacity


## Information Studies (INFOST)

- No prerequisites for entry into level 1 courses
- Prerequisite knowledge required for levels 2,3 and 4


## Italian (ITALIAN)

- Only full year students may take level 1 Beginners (ITALIAN1004)
- Italian Beginners (Early Exit) (Italian1009) is not available to visiting students
- Level 1 and 2 Italian Culture courses worth 20 credits (Italian1003, Italian2010) may be taken for a single semester for 10 credits, subject to approval from the Course Convenor. These courses require prior knowledge of Italian at elementary or intermediate level.
- Full year and semester 1 only students may take ITALIAN1005 (non-beginners elementary language) or ITALIAN2011 (intermediate language). Semester 1 will be for 10 credits. For these courses, we will do an informal assessment of your existing level of Italian on arrival, to ensure that you are enrolled in the correct level.
- Italian language courses are not available to native Italian speakers
- Students attending under Italian agreements are welcome to request courses from other subjects in the School of Modern Languages and Cultures, however, there may be timetable clashes
- Semester 2 only students cannot take any language courses with an ITALIAN code -you should refer to Languages for International Mobility instead
- If you need Literature courses for your home degree, you can also choose from Scottish Literature, Comparative Literature and English Literature (levels 1 or 2 only)
- Any visiting student can request these courses
- Students are restricted to two language courses per semester
- These courses mostly cover levels CEFR A1 - B1
- If you have prior experience in a language, you should enrol in an Int Mob 2, 3 or 4 course You will take a short entry quiz on Moodle to determine the most appropriate level for you. The quiz link will be provided by Visiting Students team and can only be taken once you have registered at Glasgow
- Courses available in Arabic, Catalan, Chinese (Mandarin), French, German, Italian, Japanese, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish, and Ukrainian
- More information can be found here


## Music (MUSIC)

- No prerequisites for MUSIC1020
- MUSIC1021 requires knowledge of music theory
- All other courses require prerequisite knowledge of subject
- Performance courses (Foundation, Intermediate, Higher, Advanced) are only accessible for students requiring them for their degree (e.g. Music Majors). They require an audition, normally by video.
- Semester 1 only students are normally able to take a single-semester version ( 10 credits) of year-long courses. Please note that options to take semester 2 only versions of year-long courses are limited.


## Philosophy (PHIL)

- No previous philosophy is required for entry at levels 1 and 2
- Prerequisite knowledge is required for levels 3 and 4
- Please note that not all courses shown in the course catalogue will run every year. Normally only a selection of these will be on offer.


## Portuguese (PORT)

- No prerequisites for level 1
- Prerequisites for level 2 (A2 minimum), level 3 ( B 1 minimum), and level 4 (C1 minimum)
- Full year and semester 1 only students may take Level 1 Beginners (PORT1002)
- Portuguese language courses are not available to native speakers of Portuguese
- Semester 2 only students cannot take any language courses with a PORT code - you should refer to Languages for International Mobility instead
- Students attending under Portuguese agreements are welcome to request courses from other subjects in the School of Modern Languages and Cultures; however, there may be timetable clashes
- If you need Literature courses for your home degree, you can also choose from Scottish Literature, Comparative Literature and English Literature (levels 1 or 2 only)


## Russian (RUSSIAN)

- No prerequisites for level 1. Prerequisites for levels 2 - 4 .
- Full year students may take RUSSIAN1001, RUSSIAN2011 and RUSSIAN2012. Single semester students can only take these courses, for half the credit, if they receive subject coordinator approval
- Full year and semester 1 students may take the following level 4 courses (subject to coordinator approval):

RUSSIAN4042 - Queerness in Russophone Cultures RUSSIAN4038 Russian Literature and State Power

- Single semester exchange students may refer to the Languages for International Mobility courses
- There may be timetable clashes between Russian and other SMLC courses


## Scottish Literature (SCOTLIT)

- No prerequisites for level 1. Approval required for level 2 and level 4.
- Students attending under a Scottish Literature agreement may request level 1 or level 2 courses from Comparative Literature and English Literature in addition to Scottish Literature
- Students attending under a Scottish Literature agreement whose own degree programme has a focus on Scottish Literature may consider literature/interdisciplinary courses offered through Celtic Studies


## Spanish (HISP)

- Only full year students may take HISP1008, HISP1009, HISP1007, HISP2010 or HISP2011. Please note that these courses are often oversubscribed. Students coming for only one semester should refer to Languages for International Mobility instead.
- Please note translation courses are occasionally oversubscribed. In the event of these not being available, translation students can normally find a suitable alternative with HISP3004
- Courses from other subjects in the School of Modern Languages and Cultures can be requested, however, there may be timetable clashes
- Students attending under Hispanic Studies agreements can also request courses from Scottish Literature, Comparative Literature and English Literature (levels 1 or 2)


## Theatre Studies (THEATRE)

- No prerequisites required for level 1 courses and for THEATRE2001
- THEATRE2002 requires some relevant academic background in the subject
- Levels 3 and 4 are only available to students confirmed as Theatre majors at their home universities
- Please note the following courses are not available to visiting students:

Performance Theory and Analysis (THEATRE4009)
Theatre Studies Single Honours Group Project (THEATRE4014)

- Practice based courses have caps and entry cannot be guaranteed


## Theology \& Religious Studies (TRS)

- Level 1 courses - open to all students with a major in humanities or social sciences, and to students with other majors (e.g. in Science and Engineering) subject to approval
- Level 2 courses - open to all students with a major in humanities and with relevant previous study; subject coordinator approval needed
- Level 3 and 4 courses - open only to students with sufficient previous relevant study, generally in Theology and Religious Studies (this course programme rotates over two years)
- Courses that run across both semesters 1 and 2 are not available to single semester students (e.g. TRS1003)
- All course choices have to be approved by the subject coordinator in TRS and are subject to availability
- Special arrangements will be made for semester 1 only students who are taking courses with examinations at the end of semester 2


## College of Medical, Veterinary and Life Sciences

## Biology and Biomedical Sciences (BIOL)

- At least 40 credits must be selected within Life Sciences
- No prerequisites are required for level 1 Biology \& Life Sciences courses
- Level 2 consists of 2 courses in semester 1:

Fundamental Topics in Biology 2 (BIOL2039) - 30 credits
Contemporary Issues in Biology 2 (BIOL2040) - 30 credits
and 4 courses in semester 2:
Animal Biology, Evolution and Ecology 2 (BIOL2041) - 30 credits
Genes, Molecules and Cells 2 (BIOL2042) - 30 credits
Human Biological Sciences 2 (BIOL2043) - 30 credits
Microbiology \& Immunity 2 (BIOL2044) - 30 credits

- Level 3 courses are 60 credits and run for one semester. If you are here for a full year, you would be expected to take the partner course to the semester 1 course in semester 2 i.e. Animal Biology 3A and 3B. Most Level 3 classes have course codes beginning BIOL4xxx but can be identified by having 3A or 3B in their names.
- Students looking to take level 4 classes should be aware of the following:
- Semester 1 will have 2 option blocks, consisting of:

A compulsory core course worth 20 credits (taking place on Mondays)
An additional option course worth 20 credits (taking place on Fridays)

- You would not be able to take a full course load in Biology and would therefore need to take another 20 credits in a different subject area
- Semester 2 will have 4 option blocks:

Block A will take place on Mondays, Block B on Tuesdays, Block C on Thursdays, and Block D on Fridays

- All of these options will be worth 20 credits, and you could therefore take a full course load in Biology if eligible
- We therefore recommend semester 2 or full year study for Biology
- Students taking level 4 courses can only take 1 course in each 5 -week teaching block as assessments are at the same time for all courses in the block
- Entry to level 4 classes is dependent on students having a suitable and often substantial background knowledge to the subject in hand. For example, a University of Glasgow student taking a level 4 course in Applied Anatomy would have done 33\% of their year one credits in General Biology, at least 50\% of their year two credits in biology courses with $25 \%$ of that in specific reference to Human Biology and $100 \%$ of their year 3 would have been focussed on Anatomy before they would then be permitted to join this level 4 course. Therefore, if you have little background in the main subject area of a level 4 course then it is unlikely you will be approved to take it.


## Psychology (PSYCH)

- No prerequisites required for level 1 but please note these courses are often oversubscribed
- Single semester visitors should enrol on either Level 1 Introduction to Psychology (PSYCH1010) or Level 2 Advanced Introduction to Individual Differences and Developmental Psychology (PSYCH2014)
- Visiting students enrolled in both semesters may enrol on Level 1A: Biological and Cognitive (PSYCH1001) and Level 1B: Social, Developmental and Mental Health and Wellbeing
- Please note enrolment on Level 1B: Social, Developmental and Mental Health and Wellbeing (PSYCH1002) is conditional on completion of Level 1A: Biological and Cognitive (PSYCH1001) and is therefore not available to single semester visiting students
- Visiting students enrolled in both semesters may enrol on Psychology 2A (PSYCH2010) and Psychology 2B (PSYCH2011). Please note enrolment on Psychology 2B (PSYCH2011) is conditional on completion of Psychology 2A (PSYCH2010) and is therefore not available to single semester visiting students
- Level 3 not available to visiting students
- Level 4 - Students should have a background of at least 2.5 to 3 years (or an equivalent number of credits) in Psychology. Please note these courses are often oversubscribed.


## College of Science \& Engineering

## Astronomy (ASTRO)

- Most Astronomy courses are year-long and hence unsuitable for semester only students
- ASTRO1001 is not always available, but we recommend ASTRO1003/ASTRO1004 Exploring the Cosmos as an alternative


## Chemistry (CHEM)

- Please note that it can be difficult to take Chemistry classes alongside other subjects due to timetabling constraints
- Levels within Chemistry cannot be mixed. Students take all credits from one approved level in this subject
- A full year duration for this subject is preferable however there are some limited options for semester 1 and semester 2 only students
- Attendance is compulsory at all class lectures, tutorials and laboratories


## Computing Science (COMPSCI)

## Level 1:

- COMPSCI1018 (1S - Systems) is available to all
- For students with some existing programming experience, we recommend: COMPSCI1006 Computing Science 1F, COMPSCI1001 Computing Science 1P
- For students with limited programming experience, we recommend: COMPSCI1016 (Introduction to Computational Thinking), COMPSCI1017 (Computing Science 1PX)
- For semester 2 students, we would expect the equivalent of COMPSCI1016 as a prerequisite


## Level 2:

- We would expect some experience amounting to a level 1 curriculum as a prerequisite


## Level 3 \& 4 :

- Most exams for level 3 and 4 take place in April/May. Most level 3 and 4 courses are therefore not available to Semester 1 students
- Only the following level 3 and 4 courses can be selected for semester 1 only exchange: COMPSCI4009 Algorithmics I (H), COMPSCI4014 Human-Centred Systems Design and Evaluation (H), COMPSCI4038 Professional Skills and Issues (H)
- Visiting students must refer to the School of Engineering Course Selection Information Pack available online. Students can only take courses associated with one single Engineering degree, and all at the same level
- Level 1 and 2 are not available to visiting students
- Some Engineering degree programmes only offer $40 / 50$ credits in one semester, unfortunately you cannot choose from another Engineering discipline and will need to take credits within another School
- Please ensure you carefully select your choice of discipline and level at time of application changes of discipline after arrival is not possible
- Project work and project-based courses are not available in 2024/25


## Geography \& Earth Science (GEOG and EARTH)

- Approval required for all course levels
- Administrative fees apply for courses involving a field work/trip option
- Earth Science courses start early and may be taught in blocks so late enrolment/course requests are not possible.


## Mathematics (MATHS)

- Approval required for all course levels
- Semester 1 students are not permitted to take level 3 and 4 courses as all exams take place in April/May and alternative invigilation at home institution is not possible
- Due to exam requirements, we recommend study durations of semester 2 and full year


## Physics (PHYS)

- Semester 1 only students must register for the December exam diet version of level 3, 4 and 5 courses and must inform relevant Course Convenors
- Introductory Physics (PHYS1010) is available to level 1 semester 1 only students but it will only run if there is a sufficient number of students. More information on this will be provided to students during subject orientation
- A minority of level 5 courses may be available to students who are studying at postgraduate level at their home university. This is an exception to the standard rule that level 5 classes are not available. Please note that there may be timetabling difficulties when mixinglevels.
- Approval required for all levels
- Only selected level 3 and level 4 courses are available to visiting students
- Semester 1 students are not permitted to take level 3 and 4 courses as all exams take place in April/May and alternative invigilation at home institution is not possible
- Due to exam requirements, we recommend study durations of semester 2 and full year


## College of Social Sciences

## Accounting \& Finance (ACCFIN)

- To take courses in this subject area, you must request at least one business school course (Management, Economics or Accounting and Finance) within your initial application form. Otherwise, you will not be able to request Accounting\& Finance courses when you arrive in Glasgow.
- Students coming under an Accounting and Finance agreement are welcome to request courses from Economics and Management (subject to background)
- Students cannot mix levels within this subject; courses should be selected from one level
- Level 3 courses are not available to visiting students
- Course codes for courses which list (Exchange) at the end of the course name are internal codes only. Please instead choose the main, non-exchange, course code on your application.


## Central \& Eastern European Studies (CEES)

- Please note that not all courses shown in the course catalogue will run every year. Normally only a selection of these will be on offer.
- Students coming under a Central and Eastern European Studies agreement must take 40 out of 60 Glasgow credits per semester within this subject area
- A minority of courses from other subject areas can be requested but admittance will be subject to academic background and course availability


## Economics (ECON)

- To take courses in this subject area, you must request at least one business school course (Management, Economics or Accounting and Finance) within your initial application form. Otherwise, you will not be able to request Economics courses when you arrive in Glasgow.
- Students coming under an Economics agreement are welcome to request courses from Accounting, Finance and Management (subject to background)
- Students cannot mix levels within this subject; courses should be selected from one level with the exception of ECON2002 and ECON1011 which are designed to be combined and are recommended to take these courses together
- Level 3 courses are not available to visitingstudents
- Entry requirements for Honours courses: Students must have previously completed courses in Introductory and Intermediate Micro and Macro Economics plus some Maths/Stats
- Course codes for courses which list (Exchange) at the end of the course name are internal codes only. Please instead choose the main, non-exchange, course code on your application.
- No prerequisites required for level 1 and level 2 courses
- All students are welcome to request classes in this subject area. Approval will be subject to academic background and course availability.


## Education (EDUC)

- Courses which include and/or linked to placements and study trips are not available to visiting students


## Law (LAW)

- Please refer to the Course List for Visiting Students 2024-25 online and Law School's Visiting Students Guide which is being continually updated with new information for 2024-25, so please check regularly


## Management (MGT)

- To take courses in this subject area, you must request at least one Business School course (Management, Economics or Accounting and Finance) within your initial application form. Otherwise, will not be able to request Management courses when you arrive in Glasgow.
- Students coming under a Management agreement are welcome to request courses from Economics and Accounting and Finance (subject to background)
- Levels 1,2, 3 are not available to visiting students
- If you are studying in year 2 or 3 of a bachelor's degree with a focus on business and management, we suggest you select Level 4 courses
- To request level 4 Management courses, you must ensure you meet the prerequisites. These are listed within our course catalogue.
- Course codes for courses listed as EXCHANGE (e.g. MARKETING COMMUNICATIONS (EXCHANGE STUDENTS) MGT4101) should not be selected as they are internal codes only. Please instead choose the main, non-exchange, course code on your application (e.g. MARKETING COMMUNICATIONS MGT4013).


## Politics (POLITIC)

- Level 1, 2 and 3 courses are not available
- Level 4 courses are usually only available to students on a Politics or International Relations home degree or major. Students should have prerequisites/a background of at least 2.5 to 3 years in Politics.
- A restricted number of courses are available to visiting students


## Social \& Environmental Sustainability - Dumfries campus (DUMF)

- These courses are for students at Dumfries campus only.
- Our Dumfries Campus is a satellite campus. It is therefore NOT possible to take courses from both our Dumfries Campus and our Main Campus
- Limited availability of courses in semester 2
- A study duration of semester 1 or full year is recommended


## Social \& Public Policy (PUBPOL)

- No prerequisites are required for level 1 courses
- Prerequisites (previous knowledge of social and public policy or related areas) are required for levels 2, 3 and 4 courses
- If you are studying in your penultimate/final year of a bachelor or undergraduate degree with a focus on social and public policy, we suggest you select level 4 courses (instead of level 3)

## Sociology (SOCIO)

- Level 1 courses are not available
- Prerequisites are required for levels 2,3 and 4
- Level 3 and 4 courses are usually only available to students on a Sociology home degree or major


## Unique Courses

## Glasgow School of Art (GSA)

- These courses are worth 10 credits each and you may take a maximum of two
- Visiting students can only take a maximum of 20 credits from our GSA \& NPC external courses, so it is not possible to take both
- Course details can be found on the University visiting students web pages
- Sign-ups happen with Glasgow School of Art on arrival - you will not be able to select these classes on your application
- Free of charge for Study Abroad students; fees applicable for Exchange students


## National Piping Centre (NPC)

- 20-credit course - Bagpipes: History, Repertoire and Performance
- Visiting students can only take a maximum of 20 credits from our GSA \& NPC external courses, so it is not possible to take both
- This class consists of a scheduled lecture series, and individual tuition to be timetabled by arrangement
- Sign-ups happen with the National Piping Centre on arrival - you will not be able to select this class on your application
- Free of charge for Study Abroad students; fees applicable for Exchange students


## Introduction to Scottish Culture (HIST)

- 10-credit course: HIST1022/HIST1025
- An introduction to the development of Scotland through the ages from an interdisciplinary perspective
- Taught by staff from Archaeology, Celtic and Gaelic, History, and Scottish Literature departments
- There may be some restrictions to being able to take this course due to capacity limitations

## Adult and Continuing Education - Short Courses (ADED)

- Available to Study Abroad students. Exchange students may be able to take these courses where there is course capacity.
- Single semester students cannot take full year courses
- Enrolment for these courses is direct with the WP \& LL team - you will not be able to select these courses on your application
- Double check the dates and times of these courses carefully to ensure you can attend the full duration of the course
- Please be aware some course booking deadlines may be earlier than the start of session. 2024-25 courses will be confirmed here.
