

#### Reduction in second-hand smoke exposure

<u>Professor Alastair Leyland</u> and <u>Dr Linsay Gray</u> were involved in research led by the University of Stirling which found Scotland has made even greater progress in protecting non-smokers from second-hand smoke than previous reports had suggested. Since 1998 the average amount of cotinine - a biomarker for exposure to tobacco smoke – measured in non-smokers' saliva has reduced by over 97%.

#### Closing the 'gender gap' in sex surveys



A study led by <u>Dr Kirstin Mitchell</u> has found the disparity between the number of sexual partners reported by men and women can largely be explained by a tendency among men to report extreme numbers of partners, and to estimate rather than count their lifetime total. Together with gender differences in attitudes towards casual sex, this explains roughly two-thirds of the notorious 'gender gap' found in many sex surveys.

Lone parent job-seeking requirements negatively affect mental health

Unit research suggests that requiring lone parents with school age children to seek work as a condition of receiving welfare benefits may adversely affect their mental health. Lone parents must seek work as a condition of receiving welfare benefits once their youngest child reaches a specified age. Since 2008, the lower age limit at which these 'Lone Parent Obligations' (LPO) apply has been reduced in steps.
