

A Law Workshop Guide: Referencing for Law Students

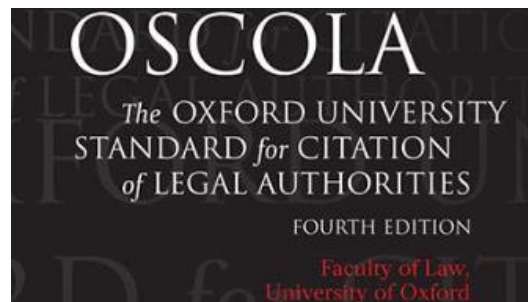
Referencing is an essential tool for academic writing. It helps you avoid plagiarism as well as demonstrating that you can provide authority for the statements made in your work.

The School of Law uses the **Oxford University Standard for Citation of Legal Authorities** (OSCOLA), which is widely used by law schools, journals, and book publishers in the UK and beyond.

It is, however, not the only standard for referencing law materials; **always check with your tutor or Moodle first before starting any assessment.**

OSCOLA is used for referencing both primary and secondary sources.

- **Primary Sources** are first-hand reports. These include legislation and cases.
- **Secondary Sources** are those which evaluate primary sources. These include books, articles and online sources including Twitter comments and blog posts.

Software

Referencing software is available to help you keep track of your reading, saving your references and bibliographies for your assignments. The earlier you get into the habit of using referencing software, the easier you will find it when it comes to referencing larger and more complex works.

There are various referencing software you can use, including **Endnote**, **Refworks** and **Zotero**.

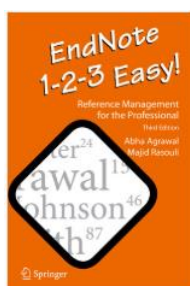
