Recruitment update

Recruitment has continued over recent months and we hope will expand with our new trial sites.

We have been working very hard on getting our new sites ready for recruitment. It takes so long because there are different governance requirements to be met for each area, contracts to be signed, our portal to be updated to take referrals, site staff and clinical research network nurses to be trained.

- Our existing Adoption Plus site will be expanding to incorporate some other Regional Adoption Agencies and Bedford will be the first.

Partner spotlight: Adoption East Midlands



Adoption East Midlands is the Regional Adoption Agency covering Derby, Nottingham, Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire local authorities. They provide the full range of adoption services across the East Midlands and are hosted by Nottinghamshire County Council. They are the latest site to join the trial.

Young People's Advisory Group Update

The YPAG met again at the end of October with three young people coming together in Glasgow with three members of the research team. After an update on the trial and a trip out for pizza on Friday night, we spent a full day engaged in coproducing a rating scale for one of the measures in the trial, the My World Game.



The My World Game is an activity that we carry out with the children and young people who are taking part in the trial to map their social world. It was originally developed by Papoula Petri-Romao in collaboration with Professor Helen Minnis, the trial Chief Investigator, and involves a map shared online. Participants are asked to place people and places who are important to them on it and then answer a series of questions such as who on the map they would turn to if they needed help.

The aim of producing a rating scale is to enable us to quantify a child's social connectedness based on their responses in the game. The YPAG worked extremely hard to come up with a rating scale which includes scoring of: avoidance, hierarchical attachment, sharing the good, close friendships, consistent reliable relationships with adult, acquaintances, trust and social engagement versus social isolation.

The scale is now going to be tested on existing date by a student from the MSc in Global Mental Health and we hope to come together again as a group in June.
