### 8. Programme Aims:

The subject area of Scottish Literature within the School of Critical Studies provides the only course of its kind in the world, offering a unique opportunity for study. Scottish literature is the study of the poetry, drama, fiction and prose of Scotland, in English and Scots, from its beginnings in the 14th century to the most contemporary work.

This Programme aims to:

- equip students with expertise in the field of Scottish Literature

- help students develop skills in critical analysis, primarily with regard to literature, but in such a way that their acquired skills may be transferable, including the preparation of students for employment or further study
- enhance students' development in articulation and persuasive argument, thereby preparing students for employment or further study
- develop students' understanding of both scholarship and creativity.

## 9. Intended Learning Outcomes of Programme:

The programme provides opportunities for students to develop and to demonstrate knowledge and understanding, skills and other attributes as described below.

### Knowledge and Understanding

By the end of this programme, students will be able to:

- discuss Scottish Literature in all its aspects from the earliest times to the present day
- identify major cultural movements, historical eras and the chronological sequence of Scottish literature
- analyse a variety of literary genres, predominantly poetry, prose fiction (novels and short stories) and plays
- discuss at an advanced critical level individual authors of Scottish literature, including major figures such as Henryson, Dunbar, Lyndsay, Burns, Scott, Hogg, MacDiarmid, Gibbon, Spark, Morgan, Lochhead
- evaluate the different ways in which Scottish literature has been critically assessed and reassessed in different historical periods and from different critical and theoretical perspectives
- recognise the influence of historical, social, geographical, cultural, political, stylistic and other contextual factors on Scottish language and texts
- apply methods of extended critical analysis and developed argumentative writing through the opportunity for production of a dissertation
- construct coherent, lucid and accurate written and verbal responses to key questions within the discipline.

### Skills and Other Attributes

By the end of this programme, students will be able to:

#### *Subject-specific/practical skills*

- produce extended critical essays
- present seminar-topic papers
- put together annotated bibliographies
- use the appropriate terminology for literary and cultural analysis
- participate in the exchange of ideas in Scottish Literature

#### *Intellectual skills*

- make individual critical judgements
- read and write to form and shape argumentative analysis grounded in evidence
- carry out independent research
- communicate findings effectively in speech and writing in a range of contexts and styles
- handle a range of critical and theoretical perspectives

#### *Transferable / key skills*

- read with a view to extracting information
- analyse literary form and draw conclusions
- discuss complex ideas
- present data in a transparent manner

- work effectively, independently and as part of a team
- apply scholarly bibliographic skills appropriately
- respond imaginatively and with originality to research tasks
- take responsibility for, and carry out, an individual project with supervision
- identify and use online and other digital resources as appropriate.

### 10. Typical Learning and Teaching Approaches:

Learning and teaching takes place through a number of modes:

- close reading of literary texts of different genres and periods
- analysis and discussion of texts through lectures
- analysis and discussion of texts in seminar groups and workshops led by tutors
- student presentations in staff-led seminars based on student research
- student-led seminar discussion
- illustration through the use of music, visual representation, screenings
- extra-curricular activity such as excursions to theatres, literary locations, libraries
- individual consultation with course tutors and supervisors
- work placement opportunities
- supervision of a research dissertation. (if taken).

### 11. Typical Assessment Methods:

Summative assessment is carefully positioned in the context of each course with regard to the development of core knowledge and skills. Assessment is delivered through:

- essays
- examinations
- seminar presentations
- annotated bibliographies
- online moodle assignments
- cataloguing exercises
- work placement-related projects
- textual editing and manuscript exercises
- written seminar evaluations
- monitored course work in class
- individual research projects under staff supervision.
